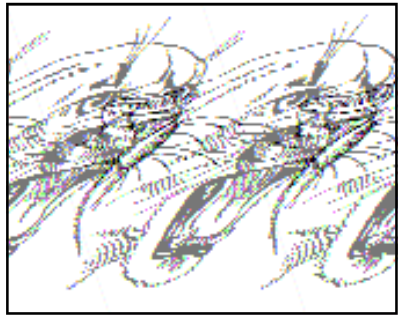

## Message from Assistant Principal Conant,

### ATTENDANCE:

Just a reminder that school starts at 7:55 a.m. everyday. Students that arrive after this are tardy. After 2 unexcused tardies students will be issued an office detention. If your student is going to be absent from school, you need to call the attendance secretary before 8:00 AM to confirm the absence. If we don't receive a call we will call to check on the student's whereabouts. After 7 unexcused absences for 6<sup>th</sup> graders and 10 for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders, a student is considered truant. This means that parents need to provide written medical excuses for all future absences. Failure to do so could result in legal action against the parents.

### SCHOOL CULTURE:

Memorial Middle School continues to help students reflect on the ways they interact with one another. The Culture Club, Builders Club, Unity Leadership Program, and Civil Rights teams are working with students to assist students in developing skills to enhance their ability to be positive members of our school community. On April 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup>, our Culture Club and Builders Club are planning activities to celebrate the diversity of our student population in a variety

### ATHLETICS:

Students need to pass all classes to be eligible to participate in athletics. If they fail one class they can be put on academic review for two weeks and become eligible, but if they fail 2 or more classes they are ineligible for the season. Students need to remember that this applies to eligibility for the fall sports season. Also, check to see if your child's physical form is current. Students will need to be aware of this as we head into the spring sports seasons.

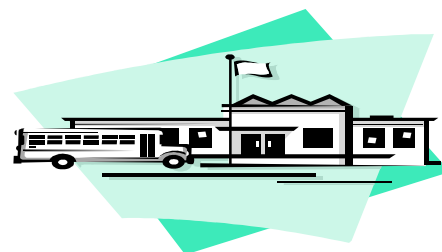

# From the Classroom

## Grade 6 News

Our sixth grade team is busy preparing students for the MEA test. The Maine state testing will take place in March. In Language Arts classes, we are working on strengthening skills. Some of the areas we are addressing are the ability to write persuasive and comparison essays, the ability to write reading responses in the Better Answer format, the ability to read to be able to answer interpretive and evaluative questions, and the ability to use context clues to make sense of unknown words. In addition, each L.A. class is working on a variety of novels. In math, teachers are working to prepare students by reviewing and practicing skills necessary to process the math test, especially in the area of fractions and changing fractions into decimals.

We all need to be supportive of the students during this testing time. At school, we will be sure to create a comfortable environment during the MEA testing, which includes breaks with snacks and water. Parents need to be sure that students have a good breakfast and get plenty of rest. During conference time, we will have an opportunity to discuss any questions parents might have about the MEA and NWEA tests.

The sixth grade team of teachers is busy planning an integrated unit, which will deal with students understanding how natural disasters and energy use affect the

environment. Each student will be responsible for researching and presenting his/her information on a topic dealing with natural disasters and renewable energies. In addition to the research, the sixth grade team will bring in people from the community to help the students formulate a deep understanding of their area of research. If any parent feels they have an area of expertise that would fit into our "Natural Disaster/Alternative Energy Integrated Unit" please contact us. We would appreciate parental involvement.

Looking to the future, our sixth grade is looking forward to our June Whale Watch. June 15, 2009 is the date set for the trip. Our fundraising money will cover the cost for students. Students will travel on Custom Coach and Limousine busses to Cape Ann, Massachusetts. We will leave Memorial Middle School at 7:30 a.m. and return at 4:30 p.m. Parents are welcome to join us at a cost of \$17.00 dollars. A permission slip and registration for parents will be going home after April vacation.

## 7th Grade News

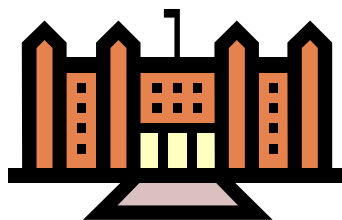
Mr. Larose's students are in Literature Circles in Language Arts. Students are discussing, reading, and writing about their books in small groups. They will be continuing their quest to conquer the world of adjectives and adverbs.

Can you wiggle your ears? Curl your tongue? Have a widow's peak? These are some of the questions your kids may be asking you while learning about how traits are passed on from generation to generation during our unit on Genetics in Ms. Meyer's class. Students are exploring how natural selection affects populations of organisms and how genes are expressed (or not) in offspring. Get ready for your kids to impress you with big words like heterozygous genes, chromosome, and deoxyribonucleic acid.

Mr. Battagliese's science students recently studied satellite imagery to learn about sea floor features and the impacts bathymetry has on marine animal movements. We are currently examining the causes of seasons and the seasonal effects on marine ecosystems. We will finish ecology after learning about adaptations and taking part in a student scientist research project.

In Ms. Meyer's math class students watched the movie, Idaho Jones and the Temple of the Golden "X"... similar to the more popular movie, Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom. The Golden "X" is the unknown amount of the variable that students are learning about using in algebra. Did you know that algebra originated from the ancient Egyptians, Chinese, and Arabs. The word algebra is derived from the Arabic word Al Jebr which means the coming together of parts. Students are also learning how to represent a linear equation on a graph and describe the slope and y-intercept of the line. Fortunately, a teacher from Los Angeles created a rap video on YouTube to help explain this fun and exciting math concept. Watch it at home and sing along!

## Health News

A common topic of discussion in health class involves the many obstacles young teens face in their efforts to be healthy. There are a number of initiatives designed to encourage healthy choices. One that we are beginning to promote at Memorial Middle School is called Let's Go 5-2-1-0. It was originally designed for elementary schools, but has now expanded to middle and high schools.

### Let's Go 5-2-1-0

recommends:

- \* **5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables,**
- \* **2 hours or less of recreational screen time,**
- \* **1 hour or more of physical activity,**
- \* **0 sugary drinks, more water & low fat milk.**

Most middle school students (like most adults!) know what they should be doing, but for many reasons are not doing it. This program focuses on four goals that are realistic and simple...but not easy! If school and home are encouraging the same healthy behaviors, hopefully there will be positive change.

The creators of 5-2-1-0 did not consult me, but if they had I would have suggested one more goal..."8." I see a lot of sleep-deprived students who would be healthier if they were getting at least eight hours of sleep each night. So in my classroom I have taken the liberty of "fixing" my poster to read Let's Go 5-2-1-0-8! Here's to healthy kids!

# FROM THE CLASSROOM

## 8th Grade News

In Ms. Donovan's math class, students are currently working on Inverse and Linear Equations. We have been comparing and contrasting the two and have looked at tables, graphs, and equations to do this. By now, they should be able to look at a table or a graph and know whether it is Inverse or Linear and they should be able to come up with the equation. We also have been simplifying expressions and solving equations. We are nearing the end of this unit and will have our test by the end of the week. Next week, we will be taking the MEA's and the following week, we will begin a new unit called Looking for Pythagoras.

In Math 1, we are working on a unit dealing with exponential growth and decay. We are working on simplifying exponential expressions and writing numbers in scientific notation.

In Mrs. Baker's Language Arts class we are reading the novel To Kill A Mockingbird. This unit coincides with the social studies classes' study of that same period in history.

In Mrs. Chasse and Mrs. Porter's LA classes, students are preparing for the upcoming MEA's. We are practicing finding key words, and writing Better Answers for the constructed response question.

Hopefully, they will use the hints provided on next week's tests. They have also practiced writing a persuasive essay. We are also reading To Kill a Mockingbird, which goes along with our social studies lesson on the Great Depression.

In Mrs. Porter and Mrs. Chasse's Social Studies, we have learned about the Progressive Era, when various people fought to make changes to improve Americans' way of life. We have also been learning about how America became a world power, acquiring land, moving from isolationism to expansionism, and becoming involved in world affairs.

In Ms. Mann's science class, students are learning about density and how it relates to real life scenarios. Students are working very hard on their density projects. Students have expressed interest in the real life relative of density. Our next unit will be the Periodic Table.

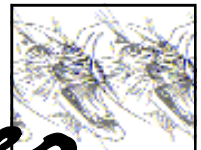

We encourage any students who have lost personal items to check the lost and found for them.

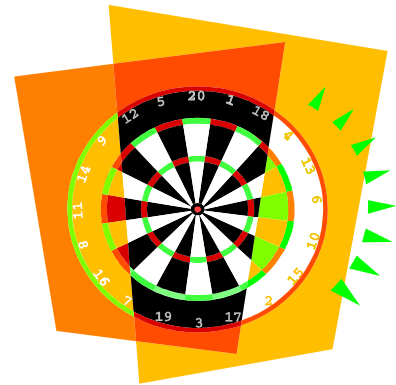


**Students in the Building After School**

Our homework club meets Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday each week. Students are able to access the homework club or work with teachers after school and take the late bus home at 3:35 p.m. The late bus is also available on Thursday for those students who are staying with their teachers to get additional help on class work. Students who need to take the late bus home should stay with their teachers until 3:30 p.m. at which time they are able to go to the front of the building for the bus. Students who walk home should leave the building when they finish working with their teachers.

Because we do not have staff available to supervise, students who are not involved in an after school activity or working with an adult will be asked to leave the building at the conclusion of the school day (2:15 p.m.).
